In our Wednesday Faith Inquirers group we are reading the Book of Numbers. Chapter 6 includes the beautiful "priestly blessing" that I'm sure you are familiar with. I asked two of our participants to do a little research on the 1979 discovery of two ancient scrolls inscribed with this blessing. Here is what Agnes and Becky shared with us yesterday, including the singing of the *Fiddler on the Roof*

Sabbath Prayer!

"The Lord spoke to Moses, saying, "Speak to Aaron and his sons, saying, Thus you shall bless the people of Israel: you shall say to them,

The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face shine on you and be gracious to you; the Lord turn his face toward you and give you peace.

This ancient priestly blessing is given to Moses by God to speak over his brother, Aaron, the high priest, Aaron's sons and the people of Israel around 1,400 – 1,200 B.C. They were in the midst of a challenging time of wilderness wanderings in preparation for their entrance into the Promised Land.

This beautiful blessing has been sung and passed on from generation to generation in Jewish homes and synagogues for over 3,000 years. Christians have also spoken this blessing from the early days of the church to the present day for 2,000 years.

This blessing is also the oldest surviving biblical inscription in existence today! In 1979, Dr. Gabriel Barkay and his archaeological team discovered what is now known as the Ketef Hinnom Silver Scrolls just outside the old city of Jerusalem. These two tiny silver scrolls about the size of a cigarette found in a collapsed tomb were carefully unrolled and analyzed. Written in paleo-Hebrew were the words of the Aaronic blessing from Numbers 6:24-26, something scholars have declared to be one of the most significant biblical archaeological finds in history! These scrolls which also had verses from Deuteronomy written on them date to the 7th century B.C. of the 1st Temple Period.

This archaeological discovery points to a much earlier date for the writing of the Torah and helps affirm Jesus' statements of the Mosaic authorship of the Law as found in the New Testament.


• The text of the Priestly Blessing is also used by Jewish parents to bless their children on Friday night before the <u>Shabbat</u> meal. It is usually prefaced, for boys with a request for God to make the children like the sons of <u>Ioseph</u>— <u>Ephraim</u> and <u>Manasseh</u>—who are remembered because they never fought with each other, according to tradition. For girls the traditional request is God to make them like <u>Sarah</u>, <u>Rebecca</u>, <u>Rachel</u> and <u>Leah</u>, the <u>Matriarchs</u> of the Jewish people. Similarly, some rabbis will say the blessing to a boy at his <u>bar mitzvah</u> or to a girl at her <u>bat mitzvah</u>.

Fiddler on the Roof Sabbath Prayer

May the Lord protect and defend you. May He always shield you from shame. May you come to be In Israel a shining name.

May you be like Ruth and like Esther. May you be deserving of praise. Strengthen them, Oh Lord, And keep them from the strangers' ways.

May God bless you and grant you long lives. (May the Lord fulfill our Sabbath prayer for you.) May God make you good mothers and wives. (May He send you husbands who will care for you.) May the Lord protect and defend you. May the Lord preserve you from pain. Favor them, Oh Lord, with happiness and peace. Oh, hear our Sabbath prayer. Amen.
