Music Notes



Welcome Rich Spicer, our Music Director/Organist



Sunday's prelude is *Recitative and Prayer for Alphorn and Organ* by Etienne Isoz (1905-1986). Rich will be playing the alphorn with Becky

accompanying on the organ. Here is some information from Rich on the alphorn:

The alphorn is now the national instrument of Switzerland. As a signal instrument of the mountains, it has existed in many lengths and forms over the centuries, including a smaller J-shape in the 18th century, and a shorter more trumpet-like instrument (buechel) still made and played in the inner cantons of Switzerland; but its most popular and familiar form is the one you see this morning, with a length of about 11 feet and an upward curved bell that rests on the ground. All are "natural" horns, meaning there are no finger holes or valves to make it possible to play a chromatic scale; instead, only the variously separated notes of the harmonic series (dictated by the physics of sound) are possible, obtained completely by the lips at the mouthpiece. The larger instruments have been known to exist in Switzerland for at least 500 years, and all are constructed in the same way. A mountain tree with a natural curve at the base of the trunk (from growing on a hillslope) is felled and halved; and the two halves are then hollowed out, laminated back together, and bound with some material wrapping around the outside (string, wire, branches, cloth, birchbark, and now usually rattan). All have a conical bore, which produces a mellower sound than a straight bore, and the pitch (high or low) depends directly on the length (short or long). An alphorn of 11 feet is equivalent to the same length of tubing for a modern French horn, for example; and thus they sound somewhat similar.

Interestingly enough, as long ago as by the end of the 18th century, various folk practices in Switzerland already were noted to be dying away, including the playing of the alphorn; so a competition was held in Interlaken in 1805 to revive interest. Though only one player showed up (!), it did serve to put Interlaken on the map as a mountain and now tourist destination; and it did promote ultimate survival of interest in the instrument. Now there is a national organization that sponsors regular festivals and competitions in playing the alphorn and buechel, as well as the folk custom of flag swinging; and in recent decades, composers have begun to publish interesting pieces for alphorn and other instruments, including concertos. Most still know the instrument from sonorous mountainside performances by a quartet of players, however--or the single player on the Riccola commercial!
