Dear All Saints' Family,

A statement from Presiding Bishop Michael Curry:



You may know me as the pastor who is always talking about love, and I am. But today I am mindful that the urgency of love—true, sacrificial love that respects all of humanity—is not just a good feeling, and it is not easy.

We are called to a love that demands much from us. We are called to a love that tells the truth.

Today I raise my voice for love because more than 10,000 people have died in Gaza, including more than 4,000 children.

The violence is horrific, and the geopolitics are complex, but my call to love is simple: Stop the killing. Stop all of it. Stop it today.

We will not be silent while an entire population is denied food, water, electricity, and fuel needed to run hospitals. We cannot stand by while thousands of civilians die. Our partners in the region tell us they live in terror—that they feel they have died even while alive. They feel that the international community is tacitly sanctioning the killing of civilians and the bombing of schools, hospitals, and refugee camps.

Staying quiet in this moment would be a stain upon our souls and would

deepen our complicity.

U.S. leadership must tell Israel to stop bombing civilian areas and allow access for full humanitarian aid to flow freely into Gaza.

Every human child of God—Palestinian and Israeli—deserves safety and security. We need to stop the killing. Today.

Vengeance will not bring back the dead. Retaliation will not repair the harms and the hurt. We are called to love, even and especially when it seems impossible.

We must stop the next 10,000 from being killed. As Episcopalians, we must call upon our leaders—President Biden, members of Congress, and others—to be unequivocal that we need to stop the killing. Today. This is clearly what love demands of us.

A prayer offered by Bishop Knisely:

Holy One, we are in anguish witnessing the violence and suffering happening in the Holy Land. The scenes and the accounts are heart wrenching. Today we implore you to soften, to heal, the hearts of those consumed with anger and revenge. We pray for a cease-fire, we pray a for humanitarian response, and we pray for the diplomats working

night and day to make both happen. We pray for our friends, and we pray for our enemies. We pray in the hope that by your grace, a new path might be possible. We pray this in the name of our Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

Musical Notes

Our Offertory Anthem on Sunday ("Eternal Father, Strong to Save") is widely known in this country as "The Navy Hymn" and uniquely associated with that branch of our military service. But its story began in England and since has been adopted and adapted by many branches of the military service in both Britain and the United States. Author of the original words was Anglican clergyman William Whiting (1825-1878), born in Winchester and ultimately headmaster of the Winchester College Chorister's School. In 1860, while serving in that position, a young chorister came to him with concern about and fear for an ocean voyage he was about to undertake over to America. Whiting immediately recalled his own harrowing experience at sea at age 35, when a violent storm nearly claimed his ship. Believing that God had calmed the seas and spared their lives, he wrote a hymn for his student to "anchor his faith" during his own time on the ocean waves; it is likely that Psalm 107:23-26 also inspired his words.

Within the next year, another Anglican clergyman, John B. Dykes (1823-1876), composed the now familiar music to match Whiting's hymn, and the resulting marriage was quickly published in the principal Anglican hymnal of the day (*Hymns Ancient and Modern*). The tune name he chose (*Melita*), is an earlier name for Malta, an ancient seafaring nation (and then a colony of the British Empire), and also the site of a shipwreck involving the Apostle Paul (Acts 27-28). As mentioned, since then words of the hymn have been altered numerous times to suit particular usage;

see, for example, Hymn #578, which substitutes new words (verses 2-3) to incorporate the perils of land and air beyond the sea.

At precisely the same time "Eternal Father" appeared in print in England, a violent Civil War was breaking out in America. Music would play a very prominent role throughout the four-year ordeal that nearly split apart our country. A principal contributor to Northern repertoire was George Frederick Root, born in Sheffield, Massachusetts, and named after George Frideric Handel. A performer and music educator in New England in his early career, Root moved to Chicago in 1859 to join his brother running a music publishing firm (Root & Cady), which in the next few years would produce the voluminous sheet music for some of the Civil War's most popular songs. His "Battle Cry of Freedom" (our postlude), promoting both Unionist and abolitionist sentiment, became a principal rallying song for Union soldiers and civilians alike. In fact, the famed contemporary American pianist Louis Moreau Gottschalk was so impressed by the piece that he thought it should become our national anthem.
